MORE AND MORE AMERICANS ARE DEMANDING RECOGNITION OF THEIR INDIVIDUAL SOVEREIGNTY

This profound editorial, focusing on the meaning of Article 8 of the Bill of Rights in the New Hampshire Constitution in the context of the recent New Hampshire Supreme Court decision in the case of Bill Duncan et al. v. The State of New Hampshire (deciding that, unless an individual taxpayer's rights were impaired, that taxpayer had no standing to challenge the decision in court), underscores the intent of our founding fathers in shaping American freedom around individual sovereignty. That constitutional intent was, clearly, that individuals have the right to be heard in a fair legal proceedings. No "supreme" court in any state should challenge a sovereign person's constitutional right to due process under the law.

In the January, 2018 edition of The Due Process Advocate (Vol.19, No. 1) we challenged readers with the question: "DO YOU SEE YOURSELF AS A SOVEREIGN INDIVIDUAL IN AMERICA - OR DO YOU SEE YOURSELF AS A POWERLESS PAWN IN THE SOCIAL ENGINEERING ARENA THAT IS RUN BY THE RICH AND POWERFUL?"

Recent headlines all over the country demonstrate the proliferation of protests and heated confrontations regarding the never-ending "clash" between personal and government sovereignty in America. This clash in fundamental ideology includes such controversial areas as personal surveillance and profiling, healthcare insurance, tax reform, political corruption, sexual harassment, immigration policy, continued discrimination practices, police brutality, and much, much more.

The slow but steady removal of individual due process rights is, perhaps, at the heart of this social and economic unrest in the United States. This has allowed "arbitrary rule" to replace the "rule of law" in many administrative agencies and courts throughout the country.

Mid-term elections are upon us and we are no more closer to draining the swamp than ever before. The swamp is getting bigger.

The immediate, public demand for the restoration of individual due process rights throughout this nation's legal arena may be the ONLY real key to future prosperity in America. Without the return of the constitutionally-guaranteed, individual due process rights (that are the foundation of American justice), we risk economic and social chaos. Left unchallenged, the existing state and federal government policies that serve to restrict and/or remove individual due process rights in America will allow more and more of the nation's wealth to be transferred to the rich and powerful. At the same time, your own "life, liberty, and property" will be exposed to increased risk of loss.

[Art.] 8. [Accountability of Magistrates and Officers; Public's Right to Know.] All power residing originally in, and being derived from, the people, all the magistrates and officers of government are their substitutes and agents, and at all times accountable to them. Government, therefore, should be open, accessible, accountable and responsive. To that end, the public's right of access to governmental proceedings and records shall not be unreasonably restricted.
